1870's Doepp & Jones Bottle Uncovered In An Old House by BOTTLE TALK reader Dean Haley

This nice Doepp & Jones bottle was found by Bottle Talk reader Dean Haley while cleaning out a old house. This just goes to show that it pays to always be aware of your surroundings You might avoid a snake bite and you also just might find a valuable piece of N.C. history.

Doepp & Jones Raleigh, North Carolina 1871-1872

In December 1871 partners August Doepp and George F. Jones purchased the Menninger Drug Store located at 33 Fayetteville Street. Dr. H. J. Menninger had been in business there for several years after moving from Wilmington where he was a wholesale druggist on Pollock and Middle Streets around 1865.

As shown in this July 1871 insert, Dr. Doepp was in charge while his employer was in Germany. Also shown is the variety of soda flavors offered in the Drug Store. There is no evidence that Dr. Menninger returned to this country.

August Doepp was born in Germany and

immigrated to this country in 1860. Dr.

Going to Europe.—Dr. H. J. Menninger, Secretary of State, left yesterday morning for a brief visit to Germany, his "native heath." The Doctor has been in poor health for some time, and goes to "Faderland" to recuperate. But he leaves Mr. Doepp and his magnificent Soda Fountain, the former in great good humor, the latter in full blast.

Mr. D., has some two dozen varieties of syrups, of which the following is his published list:

Lemon, Ginger, Strawberry, Raspberry, Pineapple, Vanilla, Orange, Wild Cherry, Nectar, Ambrosia, Coffee, Tea, Chocolate, I don't care, Rose, Orgeat, Cardinal, Paullinia Sorbilis, (with Tea or Chocolate,) Tonic, Hock, Grape,

Doepp was a graduate Pharmacist of a German school. George Jones was from Petersburg, Virginia where he served as a head Pharmacist. Both men were experienced in the Pharmacy business and did well with the acquisition. Dr. Doepp traveled to New Your shortly after the purchase to acquire what was described as a splendid assortment of Fresh Drugs, Fancy Perfumeries, the real imported French Article and the Finest Havana Cigars. The establishment was known throughout Raleigh as the finest our town had to offer.

By April of 1872 the pair started an extensive Bottling and Syphon filling business as described in the following announcements.

CITY ENTERPRISE.—Messrs. Doepp & Jones are now prepared to bottle soda and mineral waters, having added to their mammoth soda water apparatua a patent bottling machine. At great trouble and expense they have made arrangements by which they can furnish every town and village in the State with fresh bottling soda water at a very small cost, and it is to be hoped our country friends will keep them busy with orders during the Summer.



In June 1872 the Enterprise announced a capability of 100,000 bottles per day. This seems impossible as the equipment was limited. A list of bottling machines will be shown later in the article. Note the reference to the patent Gravitating Stopper Bottles.

By the end of June 1872 many of their goals were met with the addition of agents and dealers throughout the state. One such dealer is shown in the following ad. Many acclaimed this product to be of good quality and well known due to the private bottles.





Note: The Gravitating Stopper Bottle was made by John Matthews and patented on October 11, 1864 in New York.

After a very successful start, the partners decided to end their short term relationship and filed for Dissolution. The notice is show below. Even though the partnership was dissolved August Doepp continued to ship large quantities of products to other areas as well as serving the Raleigh market.

This is to give notice that that the co-partnership heretofor, existing under the name and style of Doepp & Jones, is this day dissolved by mutual consent. The Drug business hereafter will be con-

ducted by August Doepp, who assumes the liabilities, and will collect the debt dues the late firm.

Mr. Doepp continues to ship large quantities of his elegant Soda and Mineral waters to all sections of this and adjoining States. At his Soda Fountain, said to be the finest in any of the Southern cities, besides Soda water, he dispenses all the principal favorite Mineral waters of the same ingredients as when taken from the springs.

Dr. Doepp continued business until October 1872 when the operation was sold to William Simpson.

WILLIAM SIMPSON, THE NEW DRUG-GIST .- As will be seen by reference to our advertising columns, Wm. Simpson, Esq., has taken charge of the Drug Store, No. 33 Fayetteville street, formerly occupied by Messrs, Doepp & Jones. Our first recollection of friend Simpson, was twenty years ago as a druggist in Warrenton, when he was then noted in that enterprising village as a first-class prescriptionist. His stock is large, complete and fresh, and with his long experience in the business is prepared to fill all orders and prescriptions at short notice, and in a satisfactory style. Mr Simpson is descr-vedly popular in the city, and that he will receive a liberal share of public patronage, there is no room to doubt. Success to the new enterprise, say we.

On November 11, 1872 the remaining bottling equipment was sold at auction. Although Mr. Simpson continued to sell Soda and Mineral Water, he had no interest in large scale bottling. Below is the public notice of sale. Note the large quantity of bottles for sale. The bottle cases were most likely 24 or 48 bottle size.

On Monday, November 11th, 1872, I will sell to the highest bidder for cash the following goods and chattels, seized as the property of August Deepp, to satisfy executions in my hands for collection, to wit:

1 Generator,

300 Cases Bottles.
Sale to take place on the premises.

After leaving the Pharmacy and bottling trade, August Doepp became a successful dealer of pianos and organs as he was an accomplished musician. He opened a small piano manufacturing business in Raleigh with help from craftsmen recruited from Germany. He remained in Raleigh for a number of years.

Mr. Jones was not as fortunate as was met with a different fate. After the partnership ended he took employment in Atlanta as head Pharmacist for the firm Heard, Craig & Co. While in their employ he had an opportunity to make a special drink for two of the owners and accidentally included a poisonous material. Within hours Judge Pullum and Dr. Craig died from a fatal dose of Aconite.








If troubled with Mosquitoes at night, apply a small portion on face and hands








Utterly Fascinating

Pepsi-Cola Exhibit Opens

An exhibit entitled Pepsi-Cola and The Minges Family: Two Enduring Traditions born in Eastern North Carolina opened March 15 in the Manuscripts and Rare Books Department of Joyner Library.

This exhibit celebrates two outstanding entities, both born here in eastern North Carolina. Featured is the story of the Minges family, whose members are well known for



their groundbreaking history in the soda bottling industry and philanthropy in this area. Along with the Minges family, the exhibit also tells the story of Pepsi-Cola itself from its beginnings in New Bern to its current worldwide presence in the soft drink industry.

Some of the highlights include an original 1917 letter signed by Caleb Bradham, inventor of Pepsi-Cola, a photograph and blueprint of the first Pepsi-Cola factory in New Bern, a photograph of the first Pepsi-Cola delivery truck, and a large sample of Pepsi-Cola advertising memorabilia, including original Pepsi-Cola bottles representing several decades of the company. Also included are an original and unopened 1960s Mountain Dew bottle [Pepsi bought the distribution rights for Mountain Dew in 1964] and a signed 1970 Christmas greeting card from actress Joan Crawford to Forrest E. Minges. Crawford was a major promoter of Pepsi-Cola, and was married to Alfred Steele, Pepsi-Cola CEO

The above ad did not specify if this was to be a permanent or temporary exhibit. You might want to call prior to visiting the library to be sure the exhibit is still showing.
